# **Advocacy in Action Profile**

## Advocacy in Action: Clydia Cuykendall

The "Advocacy in Action" series profiles retirees who are members of the Chevron Advocacy Network (CAN) and continue to speak up in support of the industry they worked hard to build. To learn more about CAN, visit <u>www.chevronadvocacynetwork.com</u>.

From serving as Corporate Counsel for the Arabian American Oil Company (also known as "Aramco") to door knocking ahead of local elections in her hometown of Olympia, Washington, Clydia Cuykendall has always been willing to go the distance.

After graduating from Stanford University (B.S., Math, 1971) and the University of Washington School of Law (J.D., 1974), Clydia became an Associate at the San Francisco Office of Pillsbury, Madison and Sutro. As a corporate attorney in Pillsbury's international group, Clydia became familiar with the energy industry through her representation of Chevron. She made it known that she found the legal issues dynamic and interesting, and Aramco pursued her for a position on their legal team. Her

interviewer's stories about Saudi Arabia drew her in and after turning down an offer for their Houston office, Clydia accepted a position in Aramco's Netherlands office before making it to Saudi Arabia the following year.

Clydia spent the next eight years serving as Corporate Counsel for Aramco in Saudi Arabia, which she found fascinating from a cultural and ecological perspective. "You have to get over the color green," she says of the experience, but she appreciated the unique attributes of the desert country that borders the Red Sea and the Persian Gulf. She even joined the film crew of *National Geographic* while they shot a documentary about Saudi Arabia's ecology.

When Aramco and Texaco agreed to form a joint venture known as Star Enterprise in 1989, Aramco appointed Clydia as General Counsel. She

moved to Houston and built the Star Enterprise legal department from the ground up. Clydia considers the ten years she spent developing her team and managing the JV's legal matters as the greatest achievement of her career.

After retiring from corporate law, Clydia left Texas for her home state of Washington. She has become involved in local community organizations including the Capitol Land Trust, where she volunteers to monitor and document the condition of the Trust's conservation easements. She also supports the Student Conservation Association, which provides opportunities for youth to learn environmental stewardship by working to improve parks and public lands. Clydia's interest in conservation goes back to childhood; her mother was active on the local parks board and worked tirelessly to set aside land for community open spaces.





Clydia has been questioned about whether it makes sense for someone who spent a career in the oil and natural gas industry to support conservation causes. In response, she says "you can't influence anybody you don't talk to." She has used <u>Chevron Advocacy Network resources like the Answering</u> <u>Aunt Edna series</u> to show people that Chevron and others in the industry are committed to protecting the environment, and to clarify misinformation about processes like hydraulic fracturing.

She has become a known resource in her community for information like this – in fact, in 2016 *The Olympian* invited Clydia to submit a column about shipments of fracking sands coming through the Port of Olympia. She took the opportunity as a good chance to educate community members on an industry issue. The Daniel Patrick Moynihan quote "everyone is entitled to his own opinion, but not to his own facts" is a favorite of Clydia's, and she thought that regardless of how others felt about fossil fuels, she would put forth persuasive facts that would paint the whole picture for readers.

Clydia is looking forward to a busy 2018 with several local elections on the calendar. She has a knack for door to door outreach in rural Thurston County and is nicknamed "the dog whisperer" by her campaign colleagues for her ability to calm the farm dogs she encounters while canvassing. She says she appreciates the chance to meet her neighbors and have a face to face conversation about what's going on in the community.

While she wouldn't trade her career for anyone's, Clydia thinks the adage "you'll wonder how you ever found time to work!" rings true of her retirement experience. She finds fulfillment in being an active community member and pursuing opportunities to educate friends and neighbors about issues that are important to her, including the industry she worked to build.

## Chevron Donates \$1 Million to BASIC Fund to Support Scholarships for Bay Area Students

### Donation honors Chevron Chairman and CEO John Watson

On December 6, 2018 Chevron Corporation announced a \$1 million donation to the Oaklandbased BASIC Fund to aid scholarships for the children of San Francisco Bay Area low-income families. The contribution is in honor of Chevron Chairman and CEO John Watson who is retiring February 1 after 37 years of service with the company.

The BASIC Fund is a 501(c)(3) organization whose mission is to broaden the educational opportunities for inner-city children by helping low-income families afford the cost of tuition at private schools in the Bay Area.

"My mother was a teacher, and she taught me the importance of education at an early age," said Chairman and CEO John Watson. "My wife, Diane, was also a teacher and reinforced that message within our own family. A strong K–8 education sets the foundation for higher learning and a successful career. Unfortunately, not every family has access to this foundation."

## Rosie Ritter: A Lifetime of Volunteerism

Gulf Research Center retiree Rose Marie ("Rosie") Ritter has been a volunteer for almost as long as she can remember.

The youngest of six children growing up in a western Pennsylvania family, Rosie learned early to "do what you have to do." That experience at home carried over into her early volunteer work for St. Joseph's Church in Verona, Pa., where her family had been parishioners for three generations. "The church kept me busy with everything from organizing reunions to



working on fish fry's and other fundraisers to helping the children with crafts at the vacation Bible school," says Rosie.

By 1960, she also began collecting toys for needy children – and has continued doing so ever since. "There's always a list a mile long involving donations to organizations in the Penn Hills and Verona area that help needy children."

Beginning in 1954, she became a secretary at Gulf Research Center in Harmarville, Pa. But she managed to juggle her volunteer work with her work duties until she retired after 32 years in 1986. Three years earlier, she also became involved with the newly founded Pittsburgh Chapter of the Gulf Research Center Annuitants Association (GRCAA), where her activities have included coordinating the arrangements for luncheons, taking reservations, greeting people at the door, and scouting around for Christmas table centerpieces. She has also made herself available to pick up members who lacked rides to the organization's luncheons.

For one year, she became president of the chapter. "But I'm better off being in the background," she said, explaining that she resumed her work as secretary after the year was over.

After retiring from Gulf, she began working at a local nursing home and later became a volunteer in the home's snack shop.

She subsequently joined Home Instead, an organization that provides seniors with personalized care in the comfort of their homes. "Sometimes you'd go into their homes and bathe, feed and dress them," Rosie explains. "And sometimes it meant taking them for doctors' appointments or to get their hair done or for social activities. I was kind of the designated driver wherever they needed to go." She continued with Home Instead until last September, when she had back surgery and could no longer push wheelchairs and other physically demanding tasks.

The surgery has limited her mobility but not her willingness to contribute, wherever she can. And she retains vivid memories of some of her most successful activities. One involved acting as chairperson of the annual meeting of the Chevron Retirees Association, when it was held in Pittsburgh. "I organized the activities for 100 delegates and their wives, including a Three Rivers dinner cruise," says Rosie. "It has been reported that many of the delegates have said it was one of the best times they'd ever had at a CRA Annual Meeting."

The delegates also appreciated the "goody bags" that Rosie assembled. "The next year, when the CRA was held in San Francisco, someone complained that there were no emery boards in the goody bags – unlike the year I organized them," says Rosie.

Another favorite recollection involves last year's celebration of St. Joseph's Church's 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary. "We had 300 former pupils at the event, and I organized everything from the catering to the door prizes," Rosie said.

Rosie's legacy as a volunteer has carried over to her family. From an early age, she taught two of her nieces the importance of volunteering and serving others. At the nursing home's snack shop, the girls were assigned a variety of tasks, including making milk shakes and playing games with the residents. The experience left Rosie's nieces with an enduring recognition of the need to reach out to others. Her brother, Ralph, always told her that in the end, one is not judged by what they did but what they failed to do when needed.

Meanwhile, Rosie looks forward to her forthcoming 65<sup>th</sup> high school reunion. "Of course I'll be there," she says. "And of course I'll organize it."

## Alan and Marilyn Ourant - Memorable Moments



When 90-year-old Chevron retiree Alan Ourant reflects on his successful career, one word stands out: "Basketball."

Yes, basketball! Growing up in Indiana, Alan played for an industrial league team and later joined a basketball league while he served with the U.S. Army's post-World War II occupation forces in Japan. But a back injury incurred during his Army service kept him from playing again until his senior year at Long Beach State College in California.

"That year, I decided to try out and made the team as a walk-on," Alan explains. "And by the middle of the season, I became a starting forward. I think it was the first time a walk-on ever became a starter for Long Beach State."

His good fortune as a basketball player was soon rewarded, when a Chevron representative encouraged him to come to the regional sales office for a job interview. "Apparently, the sales manager thought highly of people who were athletic," Alan explains.

This unlikely chain of events led Alan to join Chevron in 1955. His first job involved what he calls "casual labor." When friends asked how he could take such a low-level job, he answered that he was comfortable learning the business from the bottom up.

He soon moved to tank truck driver before getting his first job in sales. As wholesale sales representative, he serviced industrial accounts. He then became a retail representative, overseeing sales and lease renewals for 35 Chevron dealerships.

A long-term interest in technical work got him his next break. He entered a program to learn the technical attributes of fuels and lubricants before becoming technical sales representative in the Long Beach division. It became his favorite job.

"I felt most valuable in that role, calling on plant engineers and helping to find solutions to various problems," says Alan.

He subsequently was transferred to the Honolulu district, where he served the needs of sugar plantations, utilities and other clients for seven years. He later returned to San Diego as sales representative for marketing and technical sales. He retired in 1985 at the age of 55.

### **Post-retirement Years**

As a resident of San Diego, he soon became involved in the Kiwanis Club. "My main job with the club was giving back to the community," says Alan. "It was a good feeling, both by contributing and by working together with a group."

The club organized an annual pancake breakfast and other fundraisers to help needy area residents. "We had 40 members of the club out knocking on doors and selling tickets for the breakfasts," Alan explains.

After 17 years in San Diego, he and his wife Marilyn moved to Ashland, Oregon, to be close to one of their sons. At that point, he recalls, "An old friend grabbed me and invited me to a Lions Club dinner, telling me they did a lot of good things."

The Lions Club focused its community efforts on helping people with sight and hearing problems. "We collected used eyeglasses and provided them to people who were needy, whether close to home or in Third World countries," says Alan.

In cases where people had severe eye problems, the Lions arranged for consultations with skilled professionals. The Lions also worked with professionals in the Portland area who overhauled used hearing aids, which were then donated to people in need.

Alan was also active in other Lions community programs such as a local Meals on Wheels initiative, the beautification of a local park and the restoration of park benches, many of which dated to the late 1930s.

Since moving to Ashland, he has also been an active member of the South Oregon Chapter of the Chevron Retirees Association.

He retains many fond memories of his working life, his volunteerism and his personal life, including his 57 years of marriage to his lovely wife Marilyn. And he enjoys the recollections of his early times as an athlete.

In addition to his basketball exploits, he played varsity football for four years at Whiting High School in Indiana. On one occasion, "Bear" Bryant, the legendary coach for the universities of Alabama and Kentucky, came to visit the team on a recruiting tour. Ignoring the coach's suggestions, Bryant extended a finger and pointed at Alan. "I was fairly large at 6' 3" and 190 pounds," says Alan. "But unfortunately, the coach made clear that he didn't think much of me. Still, it was a thrill to have Bear Bryant point his finger at me."
