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

Al boosts profitability in the Permian Basin – December 18, 2024

Barron's Avi Salzman recently toured Chevron's operations in the Permian Basin. Following the visit, he wrote about how artificial intelligence (AI) is revolutionizing the oil industry and could lift its profits.

key takeaways

- Steady growth: Since 2012, Permian oil production has grown from approximately 1 million barrels of oilequivalent per day (MMboe/d) to more than 6 MMboe/d.
- Al in action: Al helps Chevron extract more oil for less. It's driving productivity, reducing cycle times and revealing the best opportunities.
- Capital discipline: Efficiencies in drilling and completions are important in a cyclical commodity business. •
- Environmental impact: Al is one of the tools helping Chevron lower the methane emission intensity of its upstream operations by 60%.

tech and innovation

- Sensors and data: Fields are equipped with sensors that provide vital information and real-time data about pressure and heat.
- Remote operations: Technicians analyze historical data and control equipment from miles away, • enhancing safety and efficiency.
- Enhanced oil recovery: Artificial lift implementations have improved the production output of existing wells. •
- Autonomous adjustments: Complementary to AI, software adjusts valves and detects leaks in real-time, reducing the need for human intervention.
- Optimized drilling: Improved bottom hole assembly reliability and AI can deliver insights for continuous improvements.

"Al is revolutionizing the way we work by providing us with unprecedented access to data and insights, enabling us to make better, faster decisions and unlock value in our daily work and operations," said Balaji Krishnamurthy, vice president of Chevron Technical Center.

Gas development opportunities in sub-Saharan Africa – December 20, 2024

Despite market challenges and fluctuations, Chevron continues to see significant potential across sub-Saharan Africa. Energy Intelligence Finance recently highlighted Chevron's strategy to transition output to gas in the region key takeaways

- Chevron is reshaping Angola's value chain in pursuit of growth potential in the region. •
- While many major players are exiting onshore and shallow offshore activities in Nigeria, Chevron remains • committed to operating in the area.
- Chevron led the development of the West African Gas Pipeline (WAGP), a 700-kilometer pipeline that • supplies gas to Benin, Togo and Ghana and helps to boost economic development in the region. The WAGP supplies approximately 170 million cubic feet per day of Nigerian gas to the region.
- The multi-country pipeline is the only one of its kind in SSA.

growth through partnerships

Chevron is working with partners in Africa to develop new projects, including:

- Angola LNG Limited, a 5.2-million-ton-per-year project that Chevron has an interest in.
- Project Panther, a joint venture between Chevron Nigeria and the Nigerian National Petroleum Company. Project Panther is a third-party-financed infill oil development project located in the NMA JV area with over \$1.4 billion in total CAPEX spend. The project aims to deliver around 166 million barrels of oil and 97 million barrels of gas-equivalent by 2026.

Chevron upgrades Pasadena refinery to increase capacity, feedstock and product

flexibility - December 10, 2024

Chevron U.S.A., Inc. (CUSA), a wholly owned subsidiary of Chevron Corporation (NYSE: CVX), has completed a retrofit of its refinery in Pasadena, Texas, which is expected to increase product flexibility and expand the processing capacity of lighter crudes by nearly 15 percent to 125,000 barrels per day.

Chevron acquired the Pasadena Refinery in 2019 with the strategic intent to expand its Gulf Coast refining system. This project is expected to allow the company to process more equity crude from the Permian Basin, supply more products to customers in the U.S. Gulf Coast and realize synergies with the company's Pascagoula refinery.

The Light Tight Oil (LTO) Project aims to enhance facility reliability and safety and will ultimately result in an increase in the supply of refined products domestically. The refinery will also begin producing jet fuel and exporting gas oil.

"The Pasadena Refinery is on a journey to maximize value for Chevron and the community it serves by driving progress in safety and reliability," said Chevron Manufacturing President Chris Cavote. "This refinery now firmly integrates our upstream and downstream businesses as we aim to optimize the value chain."

Planning for the LTO Project began in 2019 with work beginning in early 2020.

"I'm extremely proud of our employee and contractor workforce, which logged over 4 million hours to complete this complex project in an operating refinery. Our safety program reinforced the focus on working safely throughout the project," said Refinery General Manager Tifanie Steele. "We are investing in the refinery to help it be successful in the long-term, which we hope will support continuing positive economic impact to our community."

The phased start-up of the asset is expected to last through Q1 of 2025 as project team members work to confirm all plants are operating as planned and products are developed to specification.

Chevron Retiree Spotlight

Dan Harris: a passion for STEM

Chevron Gulf of Mexico retiree Dan Harris always loved science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) classes. While growing up in College Station, Texas, he whizzed through math classes to the point where, during his junior year of high school, he hopped on his bicycle and pedaled to the Texas A&M University campus to take a calculus class alongside college students.

Nearly two years later, Dan enrolled full-time at Texas A&M to major in petroleum engineering. And it was there he discovered his true passion in a petroleum numerical methods course. This course introduced the fundamentals of petroleum reservoir simulation, which involves constructing mathematical models of subsurface oil and gas reservoirs.

After graduating from Texas A&M with B.S. and M.S. degrees in petroleum engineering, Dan joined Chevron Geosciences Company (now Chevron Technology Company) in 1988 in Houston as a reservoir engineer. Over the next 32 years, he worked on key Chevron upstream assets and projects with increasing technical responsibilities in the United States, Kuwait, Indonesia and China. Dan closed out his career as principal reservoir engineer on Chevron's groundbreaking deepwater Anchor project.

But while he was working, Dan found another passion: inspiring students about the fascinating world of STEM careers. In the 1990s he started visiting high school math and science clubs as part of National Engineers Week. The first time he did this, he knew he found a calling. He said, "The students asked many great questions and were eager to learn about how the world works outside of the classroom, and I was thankful to share my knowledge and experiences with them." Among the topics they discussed was how their algebra studies related to Dan's work as a reservoir engineer.

In one class, he recalled a student's insistence on identifying how Dan found a single answer to a problem. He told the student, "Working in the field isn't like school. There's no perfect answer for reservoir engineering. We analyze a situation and come up with various possible ways of going forward." Over the course of his career, Dan visited dozens of schools, leaving a lasting impact on many students.



Dan's most memorable visit was to the Andre Agassi College Preparatory Academy, now known as Democracy Prep at Agassi Campus, in Las Vegas. He had heard about Andre Agassi's school in his autobiography Open, which in turn led him to look up the school's website. He intended to talk to the students about engineering careers. Founded by Andre Agassi, the legendary tennis champion, the school was established to address the needs of one of the city's most

underserved communities. "I'd read about the school on its website and contacted the principal, saying I'd be in Las Vegas and asking if I could come and talk to their students about math and science. It was a wonderful experience. The kids were studious and serious and excited by my real-world experience."

While visiting a school during his assignment in San Ramon, Dan was approached by a teacher who invited him to judge at a nearby science fair. The winners of this event advanced to the prestigious International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF), which that year was conveniently held just down the road in San Jose. Dan judged both fairs and got hooked all over again.

Reflecting on ISEF, he says, "It's so nice to walk up and down the aisles to engage with the brightest high school students from around the world, thinking, 'There's hope." He's judged nearly every year since and found many instances when "I could almost see a bulb light up over the head of a student who was so energized by our conversation, eager to get back to high school and incorporate takeaways into their research".

He continued, "Many of the students were already thinking about applying for energy jobs – or, increasingly, alternative energy jobs – and they were eager to get my perspective. For example, I'd show them a slide and say, 'Look, each of these dots is an oil well that costs \$1 million to drill. And it was my job to get \$1 million or more of oil out of that well while protecting people and the environment.'

He can converse, albeit not fluently, in six languages, and it's always a thrill to see the reaction on a student's face when Dan switches languages while judging. He explained, "One year there was a girl from Qatar who couldn't stop laughing when I began speaking Arabic. Another year a boy from Malaysia belted



out YOU SPEAK MY LANGUAGE! so loudly that everyone around us was startled, including me!"

He prioritizes attending ISEF every year in mid-May, regardless of its location. ISEF was last held in Los Angeles, and the next one is scheduled for Columbus, Ohio. Dan remarked, "ISEF, along with local and regional science fairs, offers an excellent structure that accommodates any number of judges. The more judges, the better, as students consistently say that engaging with judges is the most enjoyable part of the fair. I believe judging is an ideal activity for retirees who have much to offer. And who better to inspire than young minds already passionate about STEM?"

Jim Ofcacek: Feeding the hungry

As a lifelong resident of Louisville, Kentucky, Chevron retiree Jim Ofcacek is especially sensitive to the "people living on the margin" in his home city. After he retired in 2017, he quickly recognized the need to do more for the community. And he followed in the footsteps of his older brother Dennis, who had been an active volunteer on behalf of the homeless during his own career at Chevron.

Jim found the right organization for his giving spirit when he began volunteering at The Franciscan Kitchen in 2018. The kitchen, which is run by a Louisvillebased branch of the Franciscan Friars, serves the needy and homeless in an impoverished neighborhood of Louisville. The organization operates solely on donations to buy food and receives surplus food from restaurants, catering companies, bakeries and grocery stores.

Jim says that since he joined the organization, "I have done every job at the kitchen but drive the truck to all the facilities that donate food." He estimates that since he joined, the kitchen has served more than 1 million meals.

In addition, he says, "My wife Kathy and I donate monthly to The Franciscan



Kitchen. I take advantage of the funds that are made available to me as a Chevron retiree through the Chevron Humankind program that matches our donations and provides \$1,000 for volunteer hours." Jim also encourages others to donate or volunteer to the organization during visits to his community..



Monday is typically Jim's day to work at the kitchen -- arriving early, helping with the cooking or setting up for the day's influx and serving from the steam table. Most of the recipients are regulars, many surviving on welfare checks or other subsidies, and grateful for the nourishing meals they receive. Other recipients are one-timers, such as a young man who arrived on a frigid February day wearing only a T-shirt, overly large pants and socks. "He was shivering and in obviously desperate need," Jim recalls. He not only provided the young man with a much-needed meal, but ensured the organization's friars outfitted him with a full set of clothing.

The kitchen, like businesses around the world, had to adapt its way of operating during the pandemic that began in 2020. Rather than serving hot meals directly to recipients, the volunteers provided carefully wrapped food that individuals could take away with them. The kitchen also had to cope with shortages of volunteers and an increased client base. But the staff drew upon the experience of an organization that had been founded in 1980 with a simple mission: "Feed the hungry." Jim says that the kitchen is prepared to cope with whatever challenge it has faced by relying on "the great people

who work as volunteers, especially the cooks who are like angels."

During his years at the kitchen, Jim has relied on the problem-solving skills that he originally learned at Chevron, especially in his position as a lubricants marketer. Jim vividly remembers his experience of going down almost 1,000 feet into a limestone mine at a job site, where he evaluated the workings of a piece of mining equipment and recommended the most effective lubricant to use on it.

Exploring his roots

In addition to his work at the kitchen, Jim devotes many hours each week to helping to raise his grandchildren. He has also become an avid traveler, visiting many of the United States' national parks and taking a Viking cruise to Europe. The cruise stopped at ports from Paris to Prague. "The visit to Prague was especially memorable because I was able to see where my family came from," Jim says proudly.

Medicare Advantage Open Enrollment

Medicare Advantage Open Enrollment

Open Enrollment for Medicare Advantage begins January 1 until March 31. Medicare

Advantage plans, also known as Part C, combines Original Medicare (Part A and B) and prescription drug coverage into one plan. During this time, you can switch to another Medicare Advantage Plan with or without drug coverage or drop your Medicare Advantage Plan and return to Original Medicare. You'll also be able to join a separate Medicare drug plan. Your coverage would begin the first of the month after the plan receives your request.

Those Medicare-eligible retirees participating in the HRA funding should still contact Via Benefits should they desire to change their Medicare Advantage plan or return to Original Medicare and join a separate Medicare drug plan.

Avis Discount Change

In November, Avis introduced a one-time password validation for travelers using the corporate Avis Discount Code (AWD) and/or the Budget Discount Code (BCD) on Avis.com and Budget.com. This measure is aimed at reducing fraud and ensures that only Chevron employees can utilize our corporate discount.

Unfortunately, retirees don't have a chevron.com domain email address to send the one-time passcode to. We have reached out to the Chevron Travel group and Avis letting them know the issues we are facing. Avis in the process of testing a work-around for us. In the meantime, you can still take advantage of the discount by using the Avis mobile app. Just enter the AWD number and one of the optional coupon codes posted on the Fall Vacation Deals flyer. The mobile app may still prompt for a verification email address, so continue entering chevrec@chevron.com.

CRA Sponsored Programs

In addition to the many discounts available for Chevron Retirees, we still have the CRA Dental Program and Hear in America program. All dues-paying CRA members are eligible.

This CRA Dental Program provides members a choice between two MetLife Dental Plans – the Low Plan or High Plan. The Low Plan covers preventative and basic care coverage, such as x-rays, cleanings, fillings, and periodontal maintenance. The High Plan covers all the services of the Low Plan plus major care such as implants, crowns, and dentures. The Low Plan provides an annual maximum benefit of \$750, and the High Plan provides an annual maximum benefit of \$750, and the High Plan provides an annual maximum benefit of \$1,500.

CRA continues to offer a hearing plan provided through Hear in America Hearing Plans. The program is available to Chevron retirees, their dependents and survivors. Repair warranty, loss and damage cover and free batteries for 3 years.
